We are proud of their efforts to help those in need in our own community.






VHS Improv Workshop Fundraiser



Reception Held for Lohman and Knowles

After 40 years of incredible service to Vicksburg Community Schools, two cherished school board members have decided to retire.

Virgil "Skip" Knowles and Carol Lohman were both elected to the Vicksburg Community Schools Board of Education in 1983. Knowles has served as president of the board for 37 of his 40 years.

In December, after their final board meeting, the district held a retirement reception in their honor.

Throughout their tenure, Knowles and Lohman have made lasting impacts on VCS, shaping policies, supporting educational initiatives, and advocating for the students, staff, and community of Vicksburg. Both have been instrumental in navigating the challenges and successes in the district over the years. "We knew our job was to let our administrators and teachers do their jobs," said Knowles. "It's how we developed the philosophy of raising our



superintendents from the inside. We wanted to help develop and create the leaders for our own community."

"It's been a labor of love." said Lohman. She said giving out diplomas to her own children and grandchildren, as well as the thousands of students over the last 40 years has been a special blessing. For Lohman, celebrating the graduations of our Pathways High School students has been a favorite part of her job. "Skip and Carol share our commitment to providing quality education for every student," said Vicksburg Community Schools Superintendent Keevin O'Neill. "Their support while I was a principal at VHS and now VCS superintendent has been incredible. Our community and schools are better places because of their leadership."

At the reception in honor of Knowles and Lohman, a representative from State Representative Matt Hall's office brought plaques to commemorate their incredible service to our schools and community. They were signed by Hall and State Senator Sean McCann, along with Governor Whitmer and Lieutenant Governor Gilchrist.

We thank all of those who came out to celebrate the accomplishments of these two dedicated individuals.

Students in the Minds in Motion class at Vicksburg Middle School visited a downtown Vicksburg business to get inspiration for their next project.

The class went to Zoja Beauty to inspire the work they will be doing for a multi-genre writing experience that is the second half of the course. Sara Miller, the owner of Zoja Beauty, demonstrated how she makes the popular lip balm sold in her shop. The students watched as she mixed the ingredients over a bunsen burner and explained the process of pouring the balm in the tubes.

Following the live demonstration, the students chose a chocolatescented or an unscented lip balm to take home. Back in the classroom, students are learning about persuasive writing techniques to create a print ad for Zoja Beauty lip balm. These ads will be given to Sara as a thank you and possibly for display in her shop.

After Holiday Break, the lip balm demonstration will be the springboard activity for students when completing a technical writing assignment in which they describe the steps of a process they will demonstrate for their classmates.

In the past students have shown us how to fold origami, how to make a fruit smoothie and how to care for a pet. Students always love learning from each other, and Sara's demonstration reinforces how enriching it can be to learn something new!

Playworks Brings the Power of Play to Indian Lake Elementary

On December 13th, Indian Lake Elementary hosted an inspiring professional development session led by Playworks, a national organization dedicated to promoting safe and healthy play in schools. Made possible by the Vicksburg Community Foundation's Innovation Grants, this engaging "Power of Play" training brought together 32 staff members from all three elementary schools, Kids Klub, and Bulldog Beginnings to reimagine the role of play in their schools.

The session, facilitated by Jenna Jordan, a Pro Trainer with Playworks Michigan, focused on the transformative impact of play in fostering teamwork, positive communication, conflict resolution, and social-emotional learning among students. Drawing from the "Power of Play" resources, staff participated in hands-on activities and discussions that emphasized the importance of creating an inclusive, active, and fun environment for all children.

Key components of the training included:

Group Management Strategies:

Staff learned how to manage large groups of students during recess and other playtimes, using proactive techniques to create a safe and engaging space for all.

Conflict Resolution Tools: The training introduced techniques, such as the "Rock, Paper, Scissors" method, to empower students to resolve minor conflicts independently and build confidence in their problemsolving skills.

Inclusive Play Practices:

Participants explored how to modify games to ensure every student, regardless of ability, could actively participate and feel valued.

The Power of Play: The session emphasized how structured play promotes students' physical activity, reduces behavioral issues, and strengthens social connections.

Throughout the session, participants engaged in hands-on demonstrations of Playworks' signature games, including "Switch," "Let's Go Fishing, "Three Line Soccer," and "Band-Aid Tag." Each game showcased how fun and engaging activities can foster teamwork, inclusion, and positive energy on the playground. Staff











played the roles of students, experimenting with how to teach, adapt, and lead these games effectively.

"This group of educators brought such enthusiasm and a willingness to step out of their comfort zones," said Jordan. "It's clear they are deeply committed to creating a supportive and fun environment for their students."

"The energy and teamwork in the room were inspiring," said Dr. Bacalia, principal of Indian Lake Elementary. "It's exciting to see educators come together with

a shared vision of using play as a tool to enhance our students' learning and well-being."

Next Steps for Recess Rollout

The Playworks Recess Rollout is already in motion, with a detailed schedule prepared for implementation after Winter Break. Kat McKibbon, Playworks Regional Partnership Manager, will work with IL staff members and Recess Supervisors to preteach select games to all Indian Lake students during 30 minute sessions prior to recess. She will join IL staff for hands-on

implementation to rollout Power of Play strategies.

Schools and administrators across Southwest Michigan, who may benefit from the Playworks program have been invited to see the Recess Rollout of the Power of Play in action at Indian Lake.

Indian Lake Elementary is excited to continue its journey with Playworks, ensuring all students have access to active, inclusive, and meaningful play experiences.
